Dear Heart Donors and Financial Partners,

Thank you! You gave nearly 900 students one-on-one tutoring in the 2017/18 school year. The personal attention, math skills, and encouragement changed their experience of school last year, and you've broadened their knowledge and life options going forward.

In this 2018 Annual Report, we are excited to share the impact of your investment.

- Students: *Almost every single student* showed measurable and meaningful gains in their math skills. 98% met growth goals on pre- and post- assessments, explained further on the next page.
- Leverage: Your giving unlocked 17,000+ hours of one-on-one attention for students from over 980 dedicated volunteers this past year. Donations supply a Program Coordinator and structured curriculum at each school site so that volunteer tutors are supported and effective.
- > Partners, Leadership, Finances: Read more about the board, donors, and partners behind the work.

You'll also see an update on 2018/19 tutor recruitment. Our 17 school partners have now grown to 22, requiring weekly tutors for 1,100 Heart students.


YOUR IMPACT ON STUDENTS

The Need for Math Proficiency

Math achievement at age 7 is predictive of socioeconomic status at 42, even after controlling for IQ, academic motivation, and socioeconomic status at birth.¹

Only **44%** of economically-disadvantaged students (EDS) in CMS performed on grade level in math on 2017 NC End of Grade tests (EOGs). Without foundational math skills, scores decline as difficulty increases, leaving students unprepared for Math I (algebra), a high school graduation requirement (right).

Teachers have limited capacity to provide the targeted attention needed to help students catch up to grade level, especially in high-poverty schools. In response, Heart recruits and supports tutors in the only volunteer-delivered math intervention used during the school day in CMS.



Leading on Opportunity

Charlotte recently ranked 50 out of 50 in a study of economic mobility, with public-school quality, segregation, and social capital named as factors². In 2017, the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Opportunity Taskforce released the Leading on Opportunity Report in response. "...We need to address the reality that children and youth who grow up in low-opportunity neighborhoods or attend high-poverty schools often find they are playing on an uneven field compared to those who grow up in higher-opportunity areas. **Many do not have relationships, role models, and experiences that help them see possibilities for their lives outside their current circumstances.**"

Heart connects children attending high-poverty schools with volunteers from Charlotte business, faith, and civic groups. Weekly volunteers work one-on-one with students, and with ~90% of volunteers finishing the full year, Heart tutors offer students the dependable presence of a mentor. Civic engagement for tutors also increases: tutors report increased likelihood of advocating for increased funding for public schools (61%) and voting in local government elections (48%).



The impact volunteers have on my students is not only academic but also social emotional and helps them feel like they have someone else on their "team" supporting them.

Improved Foundation in Math


In September, Heart uses **research-based assessments** to diagnose student needs across 12 foundational math skills. Post-assessments in May measure program efficacy.

98%

of 2017/18 Heart students met program growth goals in math, set with guidance from elementary math specialists at UNC Charlotte and CMS.

In 2017, UNC Charlotte Urban Institute conducted a matched comparison analysis finding Heart students grew more than comparison students on MAP and NC EOG tests (right).

Carl* began third grade needing help figuring out the difference between two numbers ("More or Less," a first grade standard). Heart paired Carl with two tutors who each tutored him once a week, giving him the opportunity to work on math at his level in fun and engaging ways.

By the end of the year, Carl had not only mastered More or Less - he had grown in seven concept areas. He also scored a 4 on his math EOG - college and career ready!



Deepening a Partnership: TIAA Serves

The partnership between TIAA and Heart Math Tutoring began in the 2014/15 school year with two TIAA employees volunteering each week as tutors. By 2017/18, TIAA employee volunteer tutors had grown to 42 weekly tutors, providing CMS with 660 hours of targeted instruction!

For this upcoming school year, TIAA has provided a generous donation which will support some of the cost of an on-site Heart Program Coordinator, tutoring supplies, and two family engagement events at one school site.


