Dear Heart Math Tutoring Donors and Funding Partners,

Thank you for your support in our inaugural year of working with students in Winston-Salem. Your gifts meant that 68 elementary students across two school sites had the chance to participate in one-on-one tutoring sessions twice a week, at no cost to their families. Heart students, who attend schools that receive Title I federal funding and do not have access to resources for private tutoring, gained confidence, strengthened foundational math skills, and built meaningful relationships with their tutors throughout the school year. We are deeply grateful for your part in Heart's mission of ensuring students build a strong foundation in math and enthusiasm for academics.

The impact of the 2,120 one-one-one tutoring sessions provided by Heart volunteers was evident: 98% of Heart students demonstrated growth on pre/post-assessments that met program goals set by elementary math specialists. Additionally, 90% of teachers reported a boost in Heart students' academic confidence. Thank you for your investment in Heart students' growth!

In the spring of 2023, the Winston-Salem/Forsyth County School Board unanimously approved Heart Math Tutoring as an official partner, initially aiming to serve 50 students at Bolton Elementary. Thanks to strong community and volunteer support, we exceeded this goal, expanding our program to a second school site, Easton Elementary, and ultimately serving 68 students across both schools. Your support made this possible!

At the organizational level, the Reynolds American Foundation and the Winston-Salem Foundation joined as investors at the \$50K and \$25K level —our largest commitments to date. Their contributions supported our expansion to a second full school site, enabling continued program growth and greater student impact.

More than half of the elementary schools in Winston-Salem have students who could benefit from the kind of academic support that the Heart model provides. We look forward to reaching even more students across Winston-Salem in the 2024/25 school year, with a continued focus on scaling our program to reach more students in future years.

RESULTS FOR WINSTON-SALEM STUDENTS

2023/24 PROGRAM OUTCOMES

Support from our partners provided 68 students across 2 Winston-Salem elementary schools with 1:1 tutoring twice weekly delivered by 76 weekly volunteer tutors!

Thanks to tremendous community support in Winston-Salem, Heart successfully recruited more than enough volunteers to support students at Bolton Elementary and was able to offer an additional hour of tutoring at Easton Elementary.

Thank you to all who helped provide students with high-quality, individualized tutoring at no cost to their families!



98% of students grew in 2 or more concepts, meeting program goals!



On average, students grew in 4.7 concept areas.



90% of teachers believe their students showed increased confidence and enthusiasm in math.

HMT's games-based curriculum uses engaging, hands-on activities that allow students to explore foundational math concepts seamlessly - often without even realizing they are learning.

During a tutoring session at Bolton Elementary, one secondgrade student was working with her tutor on a "More or Less" activity. The Heart Program Coordinator observed the session, noting how naturally the student was progressing through the lesson, engaged in what felt like a casual conversation. After several minutes, the student suddenly remarked, "Ok, Mr. Gary, we've talked enough now, it's time to do some math work!"


She did not realize she had been playing math games the whole time!

MEETING A LOCAL NEED

Just 52% of Winston-Salem/Forsyth County Schools fourth graders scored at or above grade level in math on 2023 End of Grade Tests. Without intervention, scores tend to decline as course difficulty increases, which can negatively impact a student's success in high school and access to career and postsecondary options.

Research shows that concrete, targeted experiences with numbers in the early years can close gaps and prepare students for Algebra. Teachers and families do all they can but have limited time to provide individualized academic attention. High-quality tutoring that takes place during the day and among younger grades can yield consistent and substantial positive impacts on learning outcomes."


With Heart, hundreds of volunteer tutors provide one-on-one, targeted support and encouragement, resulting in 97% of over 6,400 students across three cities served to-date meeting growth goals set with guidance from elementary math specialists. HMT focuses on students who do not have access to resources for private tutoring, and tutoring is provided free of cost to students' families.




FY24 REVENUE
